During the service Eleanor Bennett was commissioned as an officer in our company. Hannah Jackson, Eleanor Bennett and Rebecca Bennett all received their Duke of Edinburgh Gold Award and Rebecca Bennett also collected her Brigader Broach and received her advanced Young Leaders Award.

The officers then made their promises and received their membership cards before it was the turn of the girls to make their promises.

Service awards and membership cards were then handed out to all the girls.

During the service the girls shared a song about Noah's ark and all the congregation joined in our old Girls Brigade hymn as it was very fitting to the theme of the service.

After the service refreshments were served including buns and a cake made by Joyce Barnes in the form of a rainbow. A big thank you to her for all her hard work, they looked great and tasted wonderful.

Cards of hope for Chibok school girls

One year on

14 April 2015 marks the anniversary of the kidnappings of over 250 young women from a boarding school in Chibok, Nigeria. As we approach this poignant date, 219 girls remain missing and separated from their families. Six of them are our GB sisters – Abigail, Deborah, Grace, Awa, Esther& Deborah.

Girls' Brigade cares for girls because God cares for girls. We believe in hope for the Chibok girls. We believe that God calls us to build the hope-filled Gospel alternative by modelling His transformative and restorative heart. In 2015, let's be expectant. God loves each one of these girls and He can do immeasurably more than we can ever imagine (Ephesians Ch.3:20).

How can you help?

As a GB family, let's mobilise our young people and leaders to contribute to a collective positive action which will ensure that these girls are not forgotten by people in positions of influence.

In the run up to the one year anniversary of the abductions, GBEW is asking every leader, every girl, every friend of GB and every church associated with GB to create a hope card for one missing young woman. This could be done collectively as an opening or closing reflection during your GB night.

In late March, a group of young women from GB will be presenting all the cards to a representative of the UK government (hopefully the Foreign Secretary).

Why should you get involved?

Quite simply - it will make a difference. You will also be empowering the young people in your GB group to act against an injustice and help bring God's hope and light into this dark situation.

You will be using your influence in a positive way. The UK government is elected to represent our views. By creating these hope cards, we're demonstrating that young people across the UK care about these young women. These cards will be presented to the heart of UK government by an all-age delegation of GB members.

By creating a hope card, you'll be saying: 'I've not forgotten you.'

One evening our girls took part in making the cards and these have are now on the way to headquarters to join those from other companies to be handed in.
