District Celebration Day

The girls started the day by hearing about Kim, Eleanor and Rachel's time in South Africa at the international Girls' Brigade Gathering and with Out of Africa Missions. The girls made some amazing sand art pictures of African safari animals and they took part in an African drumming session. They all had a go on the drums and percussion instruments and even had the chance to dress up in African outfits. After a picnic in the sun the older girls made a video of the Girls' Brigade Girl Declaration which was written at the Gathering from girls for around the world. The younger girls drew pictures showing why they love Girls' Brigade. The weather was lovely all day and we enjoyed playing games outside including flip flop throwing and the natural disaster game!

We had a show and tell session and we finished with a short devotional time where the girls learnt that a drum circle has no hierarchy, the circle creates a community, drums transform wood into a joyous sound and everyone in a drum circle is important. We linked this with God treating everyone equally, that we are all important to God, that we are all part of the Christian community, that God transforms us in to something joyous and a circle has no beginning and no end like God's love for us, going on and on. Everyone had a great day and was summed up by one girl who said 'I can tell this day is going to be awesome!'

Camp

This years camp was from the 21st to the 25th July at the Green Gables Hotel in Scarborough. This year Kexborough had three juniors, one senior, together with Rebecca, Kim and myself (plus Lydia). Kims mum (Julie) and niece (Rosie) were setting of early by train to spend the day with us. By the time we were ready for morning devotions they had arrived. We walked into Scarborough centre taking in a visit to see the lifeboat station (and shop!) before walking onto were the speed boats were operating. By now Vicky, an officer with Smithies, and her three children had arrived in Scarborough for the day. Twelve girls and leaders took a trip on the speed boat, while the rest of us waited on the harbour side for their return. As we made our way to the beach we were joined by Mr & Mrs Mottershaw and Sam (a Smithies officers parents and son). Lots of fun was had on the beach building sandcastles and paddling in the sea as well as eating our lunch. Everyone had a really good morning joining in and seeing parts of Scarborough that we don't normally get chance to see. Thursdays word for devotions was for ever and for crafts we used the footprint poem and all decorated glass footprints to remind us that Jesus is always with us.

Thursday night was fair night so after getting changed and having dinner we jumped into the cars and drove down to the fairground. The girls had a great time on the rides, with Kims help Lydia even went on a couple. There was a bit of disappointment when the fair closed but it was a good end to a great day.

Friday

After lots of packing and lifting luggage into the cars we were ready for our final devotions of the week. We reflected on all the things we had thought about during the week before joining together to sing the vesper, remembering to change "at the end of one more day" to "at the end of one more camp". We were soon on our way to the John Bull Rock factory in Bridlington. We all had a go at rolling rock and making chocolate lollies before having some time in the shop. We then had a short trip to a nearby park/shopping area for our picnic and run around before setting of home. I think we tired the girls out during the week as quite a few of them fell asleep for the journey home. We all arrived safely back at Kexborough where the girls were reunited with their families.

Camp charity

Each year at camp we choose a charity to support. This year it was the Pippa Jones Little Treasure Trust, a charity raising funds for families who have children with cancer. The charity was set up in 2010 by a work colleague of one of our officers in district. Following the death of her daughter just before her fourth birthday. Among other things they provide bags packed with games and toys for children with cancer and smaller treasure bags for their brothers and sisters. The children bought teddies etc from a stall and some money was donated raising nearly £50 for the charity.

Devotions

The theme for our devotions this year was "Wider, deeper, greater, forever" and we looked at four stories from Matthews gospel.

For ever and ever – friendship with Jesus – Matthew 28 v 1 to 10 – The amazing story of how Jesus came back to life. He is alive today and we can be His followers for ever. He wants us to go and tell others that Jesus is alive for ever.

Our memory verse for the week was – Ephesians 3 v 18

"I pray that you, together with all Gods people, will have the power to understand how broad and long, how high and deep is Christ's love.
